- \* 1,300 Ages & Stages Questionnaires: Social-Emotional (ASQ: SE)
- \* 700 Modified Checklists for Autism in Toddlers, Revised (M-CHAT-R™)

## KIDSNET DATA BOOK

The 2015 KIDSNET Data Book has been published. This data book has been created to provide examples of ways to look at KIDSNET's integrated data by using maps. Mapping provides insight into the distribution of public health services based on residence. For many indicators of health status, while the statewide level may be commendable, analysis at the local level reveals disparities. Although not presented in the data book, further analysis at the neighborhood level would likely reveal similar differences. Such geographic comparison can be used to target outreach and services to residents in areas with the lowest participation in and utilization of public health services and to monitor changes over time.

## SSV PROVIDER UPDATES AND REMINDERS:

### Holiday Vaccine Shipping Schedules

Please make note of the following changes to ordering and shipping schedules for the upcoming holidays. Any monthly orders placed after December 14 or any influenza orders placed after December 16 will not be delivered until after the New Year.

### Excess Flu Vaccine

In an effort to help eliminate vaccine wastage, please do not over-order flu vaccine. Any provider who expects to have unused, viable flu vaccine should make every effort to transfer the vaccine to another state-supplied practice who can use it.

### Adjustments to weekly flu vaccine order

If the amount of flu vaccine a practice is eligible to order for the week is not expected to be an adequate supply for a two-week period, add a note to the order by selecting Send a Note to HEALTH about this order link at the bottom of the order screen. This is the best way to assure that Immunization Program staff is aware of your concern before the order is processed. Once an order is processed and sent to CDC it cannot be canceled or modified.

## CONGRATULATIONS TO THE IMMUNIZATION PROGRAM

The Rhode Island Immunization Program received the following vaccination coverage awards from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for 2014:

- Highest Influenza Vaccination Coverage Rates in adults age 18 and older (53.7% in Rhode Island versus 43.6% nationally)
- Highest Pneumococcal Vaccination Coverage in adults age 65 and older (75.2% in Rhode Island versus 54.5% nationally)
- Most Improved Influenza Coverage in adults age 18 and older (from 52.5% in 2013 to 53.7% in 2014)
- Achieving Healthy People 2020 Goals in children ages 19 to 35 months (The Healthy People 2020 goal for polio, MMR, Hepatitis B, and varicella is 90% and for rotavirus is 80%. Rhode Island surpassed the goals for each type of vaccine.)
- Achieving Healthy People 2020 Goals in adolescents ages 13 to 17 (The Healthy People 2020 goal for Tdap and meningitis is 80% and for varicella is 90%. Rhode Island surpassed the goals for each type of vaccine.)
- Achieving Healthy People 2020 Goals for Influenza Vaccination in children ages 6 months to 17 years (The Healthy People 2020 goal is 70%, and Rhode Island's coverage rate was 78.6 %.)

Congratulations to the Immunization program and thank you to Rhode Island providers for your continued hard work.
