COVID-19 Testing Information

When should I get tested for COVID-19?

You should get tested for COVID-19 if you have symptoms or have been around someone who has COVID-19. Some of the usual symptoms of COVID-19 are fever or chills, runny nose, cough, achiness, or new loss of your sense of taste or smell.

How do I get tested for COVID-19?

Call your primary care provider or a child's pediatrician to find out if they offer COVID-19 testing in office or can order you a test through a laboratory.

PLEASE NOTE: If you have Medicaid, Medicare, or private insurance, you may be able to get multiple COVID-19 self-test kits each month **at no cost** if prescribed by a healthcare provider. Contact your insurance provider for more information. You can also purchase <u>self-test kits</u> at pharmacies or online.


If you do not have a primary care provider or pediatrician for your child, you can both get tested for COVID-19 at pharmacies or healthcare clinics in Rhode Island.

Where should I get tested for COVID-19 if I do not have insurance?

The Increasing Community Access to Testing (ICATT) Program has several locations in Rhode Island offering COVID-19 testing for uninsured people that are <u>symptomatic</u> or have been <u>exposed</u>.

For example, if you search with a Providence, RI zip code seeking free testing within 5 miles you see results similar to this:



Each U.S. household can order four free COVID-19 at-home tests by visiting <u>COVIDTests.gov</u>.




There are also some healthcare facilities in Rhode Island that offer Test to Treat Program sites:

Through the <u>Test to Treat Program</u> people can get tested, and if positive, be prescribed treatments from a healthcare provider and have their prescription filled all at one location. A call center is also available at 1-800-232-0233 (TTY1-888-720-7489) for assistance in multiple languages.

A list of Test to Treat sites (at little or no cost) can be found on the Test to Treat Locator website.

What do I do if I have COVID-19?

If you or someone you live with has COVID-19, there are steps you can take to prevent spreading the virus to others and protect yourself from getting very sick. Stay home and isolate for at least 5 days and wear a mask around others for 10 full days.

Those at high risk of becoming very sick from COVID-19 are typically older adults, people with weakened immune systems, and those with underlying health conditions. If you test positive and are interested in COVID-19 treatment, consult a healthcare provider right away.
