

The **U.S. Department of Health and Human Services** outlines a section of the ACA that prohibits discrimination based on race, color, national origin, age, disability, or sex in covered health programs or activities.

The **U.S. Department of Labor** outlines a section of the 1973 Rehabilitation Act that prohibits excluding people with disabilities from programs or activities receiving federal financial assistance.

The **Federal Communications Commission** outlines a section of the 1973 Rehabilitation Act that requires federal departments and agencies to provide individuals with disabilities equal access to electronic information and data.

This **Rhode Island legislation** requires hospitals and facilities to provide a qualified interpreter for non-English speaking patients seeking care as a condition of licensure.
